A New Year brings a chance to reflect and look towards the future

There's a New Year's quote that says, "find inspiration around you and motivation within you."

The January edition of the newsletter is an opportunity for staff to look back on the things that motivated them to improve the City of Lindsborg—to create inspiration for you to continue to live, work, and play here. Some of these are detailed in the following pages, others are not; but here's a snapshot of some of 2024's highlights:

- **Public Safety Renovation**: The renovation ended on time and under budget with a ribbon cutting in April 2024. The center's updates have proven to be valuable and have positively impacted the efficiency of the staff and accessibility to the public. It is built for growth and is equipped with tech and safety.
- **Troy Miller Field**: Opened the same week as the Public Safety Center, the field was also completed on time and under budget. This was a joint project between USD400 and the City, paid almost entirely by grant funding received by the City toward the project. An MOU is in place for ongoing operations and maintenance.
- **Grants Awarded**: ADA sidewalks (\$10,000), Pool training manikins (\$2,800), Tourism podcasts (\$4,000); Love, Kansas (\$5,000); Eyewash Station (\$10,000); Sundstrom Showtimes (\$2,500); Bulletproof vests (\$3,480); HEAL Grant for The Good Merchant (\$115,000). Staff also applied for, but did not receive (or still pending), more than \$800,000 in additional grant dollars.
- **K-4 Grade Separation Project**: After a highly successful Local Consult process in Fall 2023, the project was selected by KDOT in March 2024 and announced during a press conference at the Capitol. KDOT requested the City's attendance and Councilmember Peterson spoke, accepting the project award on behalf of the city. This is an \$8M+ project funded by KDOT.
- **Proactive Code Compliance**: After a successful rollout of the policy in 2023 and the McPherson County Community Foundation benchmarking survey indicating the community's desire to increase compliance efforts & reduce blight, 61 letters were issued, and 49 successfully resolved.
- **Bike Share**: Established in May 2023, Lindsborg consistently had highest use of any community across the state continued through 2024.
- **Substation Transformer Project**: This two-year project was successfully completed, as well as additional repairs to the old transformer. This provides additional reliability to the City's power grid, as well as redundancy.

We hope that in the following pages, you'll be inspired by some of the work that's been done in the City and motivated to come alongside of us in 2025 to make the Hyllningsfest motto more than a motto—let's work together to ensure that Lindsborg truly is "the best square mile on Earth!"

New phone payment system debuts in January

Interactive Voice Response System (IVR) was introduced this month as the primary option for making payments over the phone when you call City Hall. The reason for the switch to this automated program is security, according to Finance Director David Hay.

"IVR allows residents to input their credit card and account info safely and eliminates the need to read their card number out loud to a live person."

The new system does come with a \$1.25 service fee that residents will be responsible for, but the city will continue to pay the processing fee that card companies charge. More details on the new payment system can be found on the front page of the city's website, *lindsborgcity.org*.

Dog tags for your pups for 2025

Stop by City Hall Monday-Friday anytime from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. (bring rabies vaccine info from your vet) and purchase your tag. The current rate to license a dog is \$5 for those that are spayed or neutered and \$25 for those that are not. Residents may purchase a one-time licensing fee for microchipped dogs for \$35 and a lost tag/replacement fee of \$5.

Council rewind and election info

In 2024, the Lindsborg City Council held 24 regular meetings, 10 study sessions, and two special budget meetings, and voted on 81 items. City Council meetings are held the first and third Mondays of each month at 6:30 p.m. in City Hall, 101 S. Main St.

This year is an election year for the City Council. Four City Council seats are up for election (one in each ward), as well as the Mayor (elected at large). They are: (Ward 1) Tanner Corwin; (Ward 2) John Presley; (Ward 3) Blaine Heble; (Ward 4) Corey Peterson; and (Mayor) Clark Shultz.

City Council terms are for four years, and the mayor serves a two-year term. Those interested in filing for candidacy must do so by June 1 at the County Clerk's office in McPherson.

City says farewell to two directors and names interims

Upon the December retirement of 26-year employee Chris Lindholm, Denny Walker was named as Interim Director of Public Works and appointed by Mayor Shultz on Dec. 16, 2024. Denny has been with the City of Lindsborg for 25 years and most recently has served as the Water/Wastewater Superintendent. He continues to oversee that department in addition to the Streets and Electric Departments.





Departing on the same day in December as Chris, Chief Michael Davis completed five years of service with the City. Terry Reed, who has been with the City for 21 years, serving in police, fire, and EMS roles, has been named the Interim Chief/Director of Public Safety, and was also appointed by Mayor Shultz on Dec. 16, 2024.





"The City of Lindsborg is so fortunate to have depth within our departments that allows for succession planning and the chance for our employees to step into new roles," said Kristi Northcutt, City Administrator. "With a staff of only 32 full-time employees, that isn't always possible, so we do not take for granted how lucky we are in Lindsborg to have longevity, loyalty, and experience that lead to opportunity."

Staff spotlights

Lineman Gavin Soukup, Public Works, was accepted into the Kansas Arborist Association in 2024.

Public Safety Center renovation completed

The newly renovated building included the addition of a new locker room, two interview rooms, updated technology room and equipment, expanded evidence areas, and a lot more. The project came in on time and under budget, and was also awarded grant dollars to help ease the burden on taxpayers.



Bethany College Resource Fair

Members of the City staff attended the back-to-school fair at Bethany in an effort to educate students about important public safety issues and helpful programs for them to utilize during the school year.



Recreation is a team game

Parks Director Noah Flores and Recreation Director Lauren Doak debuted Chalk the Walk Day during the summer. Residents were invited to let their imaginations run wild and use chalk to draw on the sidewalks of Riverside Park. Lauren and SRO Adams also participated in the elementary school's Field Day (*left*).

New ambulance added to the fleet

Acquired a new ambulance equipped with advanced features which include, upgraded lighting, modernized controls, updated cabinetry, and an internal camera system in the treatment area to enhance patient safety and monitoring. Additionally, it also features a Stryker Power Load System, which improves patient safety by providing support and stability during cot loading and unloading while reducing the risk of operator injuries. The full cost of the new ambulance was reimbursed by McPherson County through ARPA funds.

Troy Miller Field opens with community teamwork

Working together to accomplish important projects is a must, especially in smaller communities. The opening of Troy Miller Field highlights just what can happen when people work towards a common goal. City staff and USD400 worked closely on all aspects of getting the field built, and that hard work payed off at the ribbon cutting on Friday, April 5. The field's namesake, Coach Troy Miller, sadly passed away later in the year.



Lift Up Lindsborg offers helping hand

The LUL program added seven home projects in 2024 totaling \$16,500 in funds going back into the community. The projects ranged from new windows, a new front porch, and five houses repainted.



The award-winning CVB works to highlight Lindsborg

Tourism is a big part of the Lindsborg economy, and in October the Lindsborg CVB was recognized for its efforts in driving visitors to our community. At the Kansas Tourism Conference, Visit Lindsborg was awarded 1st Place in four of the six marketing categories for mid-sized communities with marketing budgets of \$20,000-\$100,000.

Busy and productive 2024 for Community Development

Often times, the day-to-day work for the Community Development staff is never the same. Speaking with residents regarding various topics, inspections, committee meetings, permits review, and a lot more keep the workday moving. 2024 saw a lot of successes and progress for our community. Below is a brief year-in-review for Community Development.

- 61 compliance notices issued; 49 successfully resolved
- 91 permits issued
- Housing Development (approximately)
 - o Five homes for sale currently;
 - o Three homes for rent including duplexes; and
 - o 17 new constructed homes built in 2024.
- Lift Up Lindsborg 2024: Included seven home projects totaling to \$16,500.00 in program funds back into the community:
 - o One resident added windows:
 - o One resident built a new front porch; and
 - o Five residents painted their homes
- Bike Share 2024: First full year with KanCycle Bike Share Program (see chart on the right).

988 Hotline is a Resource in the New Year

The holidays are known as the "Hap-happiest time of the year," but for many, they can be the hardest. As the new year starts, mental health is a topic that should be discussed, and there is a resource that is often overlooked.

9-1-1 dispatchers must answer every call that comes in, but 60% of calls are requests for information, nonemergency police calls, or mental health issues that would be better served by calling the local crisis line. The 9-8-8 Lifeline is available 24/7 for those facing mental health struggles, emotional distress, alcohol or drug use concerns, or who just need someone to talk to. Caring, trained counselors are available to talk. You can even text or chat online with a counselor, as well. Conversations are free and confidential.

In 2023*, McPherson County had calls that were coded:

- 52 Mental Disorder (behavioral problems)
- 107 Threatening Suicide/Attempted Suicide
- 41 Overdose/Poisoning (mostly drug ODs)
- 21 Psychiatric/Abnormal Behavior/Suicide Attempt

988 SUICIDE & CRISIS

24/7 CALL, TEXT, CHAT

The National Suicide Hotline Designation Act, signed into law after the passage of bipartisan legislation in 2020, authorized

988 as a new three-digit number for suicide and mental health crisis. All telephone service and text providers in the U.S. and the five major U.S. territories were required by the federal government to activate 988 by July 2022. This was a culmination of a three-year joint effort by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Federal Communications Commission (FCC), and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to put crisis care more in reach for people in need and became an accelerated priority after the COVID-19 pandemic.

The U.S. had one death by suicide every 11 minutes in 2020, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Suicide was the second leading cause of death for young people aged 10-14 and 25-34. From April 2020 to 2021, more than 100,000 people died from drug overdoses. Studies have shown that after speaking with a trained crisis counselor, most Lifeline callers are significantly more likely to feel less depressed, less suicidal, less overwhelmed, and more hopeful.

As always, the Lindsborg Police Department and our officers are here for you, as well. Never hesitate to call 911 if you need help or someone to talk to. Both 988 and 911 are resources to help address the needs in our community.

PUBLIC WORKS - JANUARY 2025

Public Works projects summary heading into the new year

No department's work scope and versatility matches the responsibilities of Public Works. From electricity, water, streets, and more, the Public Works staff's impact on day-to-day life in Lindsborg is vast. With the departure of long-time director Chris Lindholm last month, now is the perfect time to take a look at some of the department's projects and provide a statue update.

AMI upgrade water

Water endpoints did not arrive until late 2022. Installation began in the spring of 2023, but the process has been slow because of several other water projects and upgrades to the billing software at City Hall. At the end of 2023, 40% of the endpoints had been installed. Installation continues and as of the end of June 2024, 65% of the installation is complete. As of the end of November 2024, 80% of the endpoints have been installed. The remaining endpoints will include the replacement of the water meter of which most of them are residential and the remaining will be 1.5" or larger meters.

Substation transformer project

- Work took place all of 2023 preparing for the additional transformer—construction of a new base and containment pit for the new transformer, moving around old breakers and preparing for new breaker installation, new wiring pulled in, and new relays and controls added.
- The new transformer arrived in August and was tested for service.
- The new breakers arrived in December 2023. KMEA Mid-States and the Electric staff worked on the final high-side connections to have the new transformer operational by mid-spring 2024.
- Work continued through the early part of the year to finish various parts of the control system and bus bar connections.
- The final checks were made in the first part of May and on May 7, 2024 the loads were split. The west and central circuits went onto the new transformer and the east circuit along with MKC remained on the old transformer.
- Sunbelt Solomon was on site the week of October 21 and did the maintenance and testing of the old transformer. KMEA crews did the work on the LTC controls and finished the change out of the new primary feed to the old transformer.

Cow Creek sedimentation removal

- Phase One finished in late summer of 2023. Some conversations have taken place with Phase Two holdouts and have been productive.
- Additional conversations have taken place with the first property owner on the north side of town. Wilson & Co. completed a basic project plan for what needs to be done on that property. Staff met with the property owners and discussed plans and the work that needs to be done.

Crack and Mastic sealing work on Streets

- The Street Department sealed cracks using the normal crack sealing machine. They follow up on previous years' sealing as well as expand each year onto other streets working to stay ahead of small problems before they become larger issues.
- For the second straight year they also utilized a Mastic Crack sealant which helps seal larger cracks and helps to improve ride quality on streets with larger cracks.

Chip sealing

• Crews from APAC were in Lindsborg during July to complete 39,024 sq/yds of chip seal.

PARKS - JANUARY 2025

2024 park improvements

A good parks system is conducive to a healthy and vibrant community. Knowing this, the Parks Department takes pride in our facilities and has continued to expand and maintain our features. One important and beloved feature is the community-built Viking Valley Playground at Swensson Park.

Some may have noticed the fresh paint at Viking Valley recently. Not only has the playground been improved, but other items in our parks have been addressed.

The following items were completed in 2024 or are in the process of being completed for 2025:

- New mulch at the playgrounds was installed
- Features in the Viking Valley playground have been painted
- New seating with a canopy was installed in Viking Valley
- The bathrooms at Swensson park were repainted inside
- New skylights were installed in the bathrooms at Swensson Park
- Grading of the ground was done to mitigate water pooling around the bandshell at Swensson Park and the Bandshell was sealed to protect it from further water infiltration
- Playground platforms at Riverside Park are being replaced
- New playground equipment has been ordered with a plan to install over the winter. These items include a slide, swings, swing mats, and a rope ladder.
- ADA sidewalks will be added in Swensson Park to connect features to Main Street and to each other within the park. This is possible thanks to a grant from the McPherson County Community Foundation.



This year, the Kansas Forest Service collected data and mapped all of Lindsborg's street trees. A street tree is a tree that is located between the sidewalk and the street. The data collected includes the species, condition, diameter, and location. This data will be input into charts and percentages to easily decipher the data. These factors are important in assessing the condition of our urban canopy. This data will enable the city to make well-informed decisions in the future and see continuing trends in our urban forest.

It is important that the community uses this data to compare diversity within our tree canopy. Due to possible disease, age, and drought, identifying species and conditions is important. There is a need to diversify between species and ages to keep our canopy healthy and maximize the benefits they can provide. Pine wilt and emerald ash borer are examples of factors that can decimate only pines and elms. So, a community would want to have a diverse canopy that would have resilience and be able to lose a portion but have other species to fill in the canopy.

There are many benefits to our urban canopy; a few are listed below.

- Trees reduce energy costs by shading buildings;
- Trees reduce carbon emissions, a greenhouse gas;
- Trees provide animal habitat;
- Trees increase property values; and
- Trees create comfortable outdoor spaces for recreation and exercise.

Thank you to the Tree Board for their hard work and guidance to assist with this project.


